## ON THE SECOND DAY...

## A Reading from our Tradition:

Didache, 1st Century CE

There are two ways, one of life and one of death, but a great difference between the two ways. The way of life, then, is this: First, you shall love God who made you; second, love your neighbor as yourself, and do not do to another what you would not want done to you. And of these sayings the teaching is this: Bless those who curse you, and pray for your enemies, and fast for those who persecute you. For what reward is there for loving those who love you? Do not the Gentiles do the same? But love those who hate you, and you shall not have an enemy. Abstain from fleshly and worldly lusts. If someone strikes your right cheek, turn to him the other also, and you shall be perfect. If someone impresses you for one mile, go with him two. If someone takes your cloak, give him also your coat. If someone takes from you what is yours, ask it not back, for indeed you are not able. Give to every one who asks you, and ask it not back...

## A Reading from the Gospel According to Matthew:

<sup>36</sup> Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples, 'Sit here while I go over there and pray.' <sup>37</sup>He took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be grieved and agitated. <sup>38</sup>Then he said to them, 'I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and stay awake with me.' <sup>39</sup>And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed, 'My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want.' <sup>40</sup>Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, 'So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? <sup>41</sup>Stay awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.' <sup>42</sup>Again he went away for the second time and prayed, 'My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done.' <sup>43</sup>Again he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. <sup>44</sup>So leaving them again, he went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words. <sup>45</sup>Then he came to the disciples and said to them, 'Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? Thomas Stockwell, 21, was beaten early on the morning of Feb. 25 [in the year of our Lord two thousand and five] at the intersection of two downtown streets as he spoke on a cell phone to a friend. He suffered cuts on his face, a boot mark on his forehead, a broken nose and an assortment of swollen body parts.

"It just opens your eyes up a little more to the anger and hatred and hostility people feel, lurking beneath the surface," he told The Herald-Sun of Durham in a recent interview. "If it can happen here, it can happen anywhere."

He said the group of men called him a homosexual epithet several times, chased him and beat him. Stockwell was walking toward friend Rachael King and talking to her on a cell phone. They were a block or two away from each other when he was attacked. Suddenly, she heard snippets of strained conversation. Stockwell made a comment about "those guys," and then she heard shouts. Then, nothing. "I heard him yelling, and then I heard the phone drop and hit the ground," King said.

"Like two minutes later, this random girl picked up the phone and said 'are you his friend? You'd better get over here. He's at the corner of Franklin and Columbia.' "

When she got there moments later, Stockwell was crouched on the pavement, dazed, his face a swath of bright crimson. "He was covered, covered in blood," recalled King. "It was all over his face, all over his jeans, all over the ground." *Covered, covered in blood.*
